# What is a concern?

Something that makes you worried or anxious.

You are **concerned** about something if it is making you feel worried or anxious.

You can be **concerned** for yourself and you can be **concerned** for other people.

## What to do when you see online abuse or inappropriate content

You may come across something upsetting or concerning online.

It is important that you feel confident about what to do if you do see something inappropriate online that makes you worried or anxious.

If you're worried about something online, you can contact the NSPCC helpline for free support and advice or you can contact Childline.

1. Tell an adult.

Do not be embarrassed.

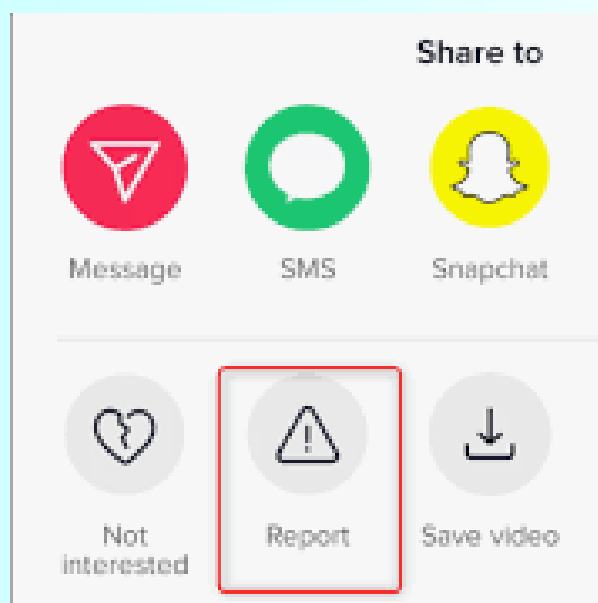
You should not get in trouble.

## 2. Block and Report

To report a video in your TikTok app:

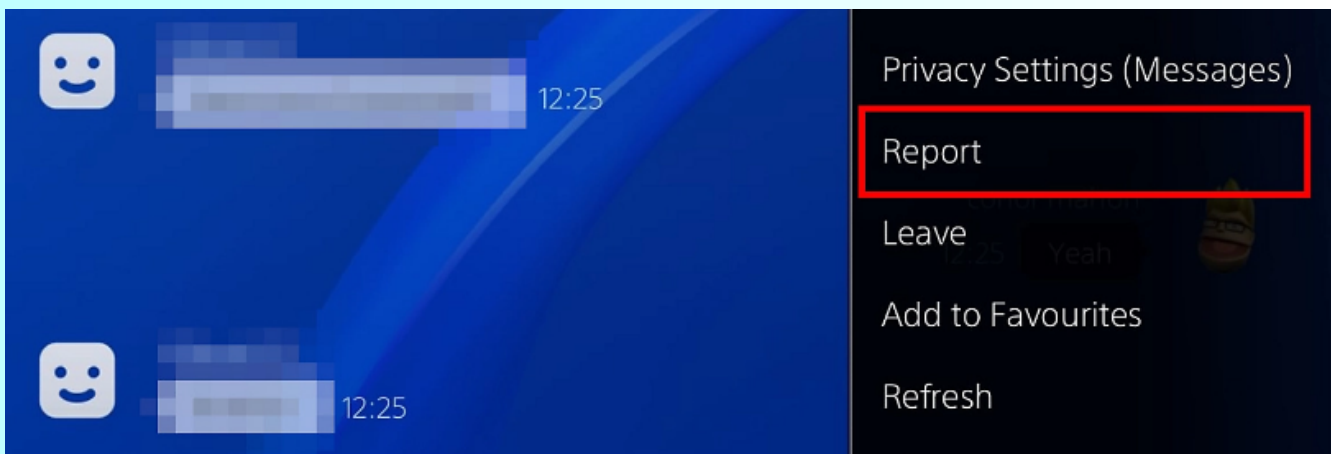
1. Go to the video you need to report.
2. Press and hold on the video.
3. Select **Report** and follow the instructions provided.



## 2. Block and Report

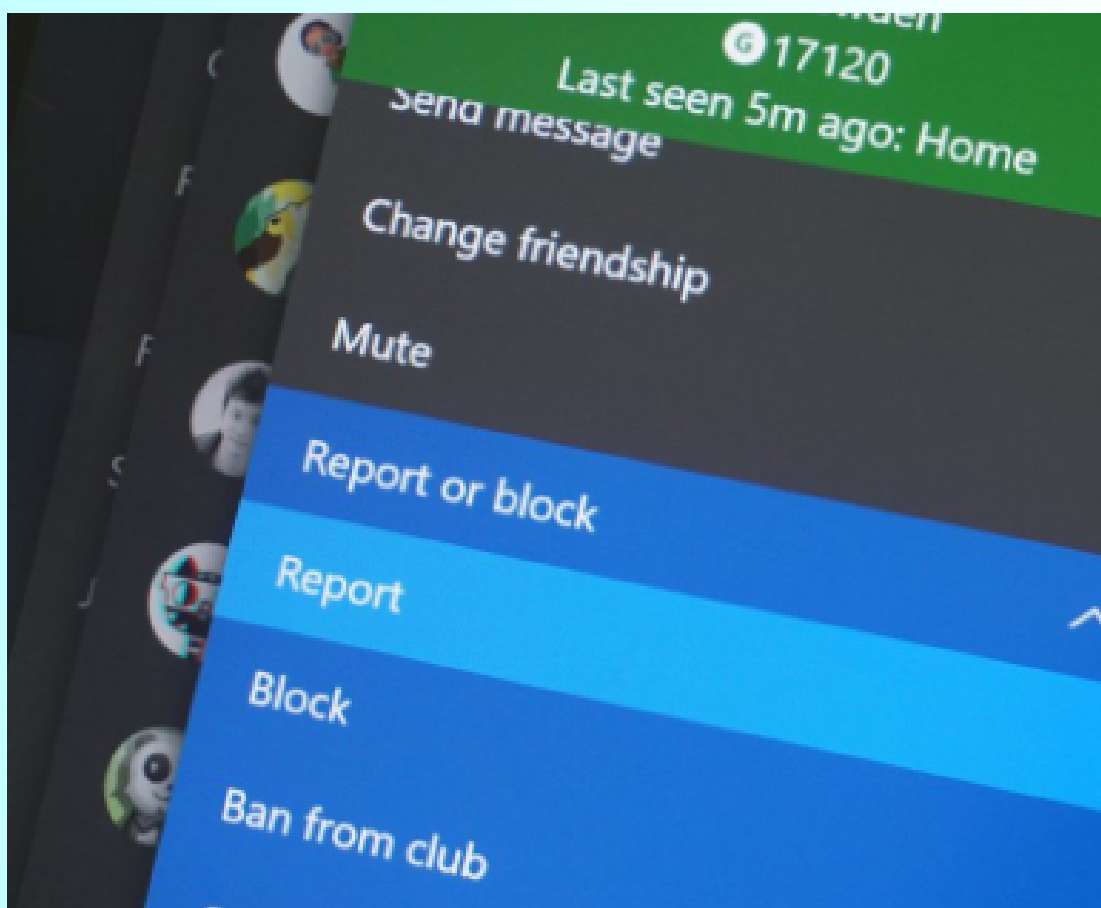
On PS4 and PS5 consoles you can report Messages, Friend requests, Live broadcasts, Player Profiles and Party text chat.

To report, highlight the piece of content that breaks the Community Code of Conduct, press the OPTIONS button, select Report and the reason for your report.



## 2. Block and Report

Xbox removes harmful content and behaviours but you need to report it first.

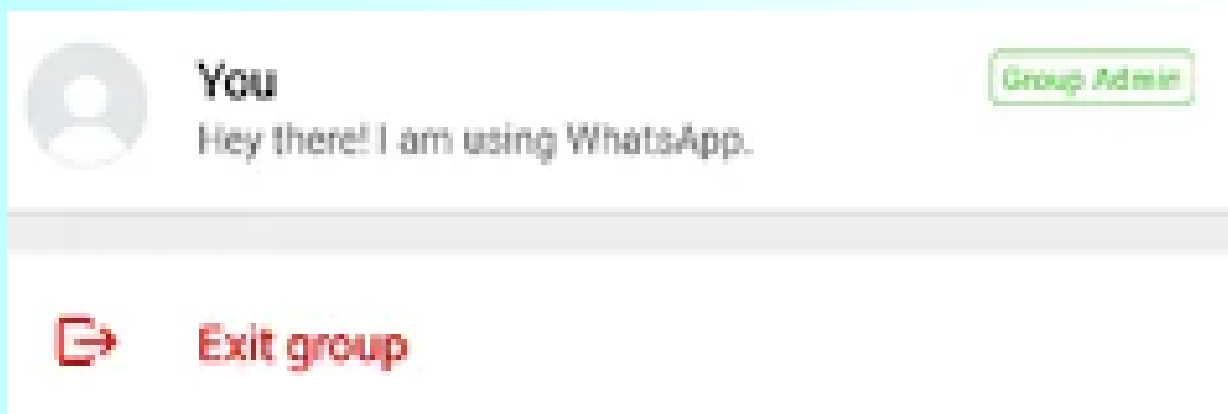


### 3. Leave

Leaving a chat or group can help. You can then tell an adult or report the player, message or video later.

Open the WhatsApp group chat, then tap the group subject. Alternatively, tap and hold the group in the CHATS tab.

Tap Exit group > EXIT.



If you are **concerned** about something online, report it, block it, and tell an adult.
